

Control descriptions – examples

White, Yellow and Orange (and Red, where available) courses usually have written control descriptions.

The other courses use pictorial descriptions.

Generally the written control descriptions refer to terms in common use. The pictorial control descriptions are defined on the IOF website (see above) but to explain precisely what each feature looks like is beyond the scope of this document.

These are just examples of what they might look like.

Control number

Pictorial descriptions are quite complicated; symbols in different columns carry different meanings. This column describes the feature; if there is more than one of that feature in the control circle, the column to its left will indicate which one the control is on. Columns further to the right give more information and indicate exactly where on the feature the control is. In this example, control number 10 will have the code 233, you will find it on the northwest side of a hill, which will be the west-most one in the control circle. Refer to IOF website for details.
